



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DEPARTMENT ORGANIZATIONAL CHART



THE LIQUOR INDUSTRY IN AMERICA

The manufacture, sale, service and consumption of alcoholic beverages can be traced to early civilizations throughout the world. The concerns of the American public over alcohol use, which may be accompanied by severe and extensive liquor related problems, led to "Prohibition" with the ratification of the 18th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

The regulated liquor industry was established in 1933 with the adoption of the 21st Amendment to the Constitution of the United States. The 21st Amendment which repealed the 18th Amendment (Prohibition), provides in paragraph 2 thereof:

"The transportation or importation into any State, Territory, or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited."

Under this provision of the 21st Amendment, the states were given broad powers to absolute prohibit, limit, and regulate the traffic of intoxicating liquors within their borders.

With the adoption of the 21st Amendment, legislative bodies enacted laws to maintain control of the liquor industry and designated the responsibilities to federal, state and county agencies for the enforcement of these laws. Violations of these laws can lead to immeasurable liability, property damage, personal tragedy, injury or death. A system of strict licensing procedures and stringent controls over those

licensed to conduct business in the liquor industry were instituted. The public can be assured the highest standard of integrity and responsibility with these legislation and the operations of the liquor industry which are conducive to the health, safety, and welfare of the community they serve.

No other industry conducts its business within a complexity of governmental regulations as that which controls the liquor industry. These regulations govern manufacture, importation, sale, service and other aspects of the industry. The licensees of the alcoholic beverage industry must maintain strict observance of these regulations if they are to fulfill the trust placed in them by the 21st Amendment and the American people.

THE AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

The 18th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America. Ratified in 1919. Repealed in 1933.

"Section 1. After one year from the ratification of this article, the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

Section 2. The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress."

The 21st Amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America, ratified in 1933, provides:

"Section 1. The eighteenth article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

Section 2. The transportation or importation into any State, Territory, or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

Section 3. The article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by conventions in the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress."

CHARTER County of Maui, Chapter 13 Department of Liquor

Control

Section 8-13.1. Organization. There shall be a department of liquor control consisting of a liquor control commission, a liquor control adjudication board, a director of liquor control, and the necessary staff.

Section 8-13.2. Liquor Control Commission. The liquor control commission shall consist of nine members appointed by the mayor with the approval of the council.

The liquor control commission shall:

- 1. Prepare and submit a request for an annual appropriation for the operation of the department.
- 2. Adopt rules having the force and effect of law for the administration of liquor control in the county and to carry out provisions of the liquor control laws of the State, including, but not limited to, the fixing of liquor license fees.
- 3. Grant, renew or refuse applications for licenses for the manufacture, importation and sale of liquor in the county under applicable laws and regulations.
- 4. Annually review and evaluate the performance of the director of liquor control and submit a report to the mayor and the council.
- 5. Have such other powers and duties as may be provided by law not in conflict with the provisions of this section.

Board. The liquor control adjudication board shall consist of nine members appointed by the mayor with the approval of the council. The liquor control adjudication board shall hear and determine administrative complaints of the director regarding violations of the liquor control laws of the State or of rules of the liquor control commission, and impose penalties for violations thereof as may be provided by law.

Section 8-13.4. Director of the Department of Liquor Control. The director of the department of liquor control shall be appointed and may be removed by the liquor control commission. The director may be removed by the liquor control commission only after being informed in writing of the charges which are resulting in the director's dismissal, and after being given a hearing before the commission. The director of the department of liquor control shall have had a minimum of five years experience in law enforcement, at least three of which shall have been in an administrative capacity.

Section 8-13.5. Powers, Duties and Functions. The director of liquor control shall:

- 1. Be the administrative head of the department of liquor control.
- 2. Investigate violations of the liquor control laws of the State and of rules established by the liquor control commission.
- 3. Investigate applications for liquor licenses.
- 4. Have such other powers and duties as may be assigned by the mayor or as may be provided by law.

DEPARTMENT MISSION STATEMENT

To protect the health, safety and welfare of the general public by regulating and controlling the liquor industry in the importation, manufacture, sale and service of alcoholic beverages to provide a safe and healthy environment for the people of Maui County.

DEPARTMENT GOALS

- 1. To enforce the Hawaii Revised Statutes and the rules established by the Liquor Commission, County of Maui.
- 2. To promote liquor control through alcohol education and to achieve voluntary compliance with liquor laws and rules by licensees.
- 3. To control the conditions associated with the importation, manufacture, sale and service of alcoholic beverages through a fair and efficient licensing and permit process.
- 4. To provide the necessary staff and services to the Liquor Commission and Liquor Control Adjudication Board to carry out their responsibilities as set forth within the Hawaii Revised Statutes and the Charter of the County of Maui.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Department of Liquor Control is responsible for the regulation and control of the importation, manufacture, sale, and service of alcoholic beverages by providing services in liquor license and permit applications, licensees' education, site inspections, and enforcement of liquor laws and rules. All funding for the Department is derived solely from liquor license fees.

PROGRAM OBJECTIVE

To carry out effective enforcement of liquor laws and rules, to offer ongoing education for licensees and their employees, and to provide fair and efficient licensing and permit processes as directed by the Liquor Commission.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

The Department actively participated in the legislative process and provided testimony on several liquor related bills.

Department personnel assisted licensees with their needs and conducted certification examinations and training on Lanai, Molokai, Hana, and other locations.

The Department continued to monitor noise emanating from several liquor licensed premises due to complaints registered by the public.

GOALS AND EXPECTATIONS

The Department will meet and work in partnership with liquor licensees, associations representing licensees, neighborhood boards, governmental agencies and the public to address and resolve the various concerns while protecting the health, safety, and welfare of the public.

The Department will continue to enforce the Hawaii Revised Statutes and the rules established by the Liquor Commission, County of Maui; to promote liquor control through alcohol education; and to control the conditions associated with the importation, manufacture, sale and service of alcoholic beverages through a fair and efficient licensing and permit process. This will be and has been accomplished by inspecting liquor licensed premises, conducting minor decoy operations, responding to concerns

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of the general public and other law enforcement agencies, conducting educational and certification classes, and providing services for licensing and permits.

LIQUOR COMMISSION

The Liquor Commission, County of Maui, consists of nine members appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the County Council. The Commission has the authority to grant, refuse, suspend, and revoke any license for the manufacture, importation, and sale of liquors in the County of Maui. The Commission also has the responsibility of requesting annual appropriations for the operation of the department; promulgating rules and regulations for the administration of liquor control in the County of Maui; and appointing a Director.

The Liquor Commission held eighteen meetings during Fiscal Year 2016.

New members Brenda Lee and Nane Aluli replaced Frank Sylva and Zachary Paz whose terms expired on March 31, 2016.

HRS, §281-17, Jurisdiction and powers.

- (a) The liquor commission, within its own county, shall have the sole jurisdiction, power, authority, and discretion, subject only to this chapter:
- (1) To grant, refuse, suspend, and revoke any licenses for the manufacture, importation, and sale of liquors;
- (2) To take appropriate action against a person who, directly or indirectly, manufactures, sells, or purchases any liquor without being authorized pursuant to this chapter; provided that in counties which have established by charter a liquor control adjudication board, the board shall have the jurisdiction, power, authority, and discretion to hear and determine administrative complaints of the director regarding violations of the liquor laws of the State or of the rules of the liquor commission, and impose penalties for violations thereof as may be provided by law;
- (3) To control, supervise, and regulate the manufacture, importation, and sale of liquors by investigation, enforcement, and education; provided that any educational program shall be limited to the commission staff, commissioners, liquor control adjudication board members, licensees and their employees and shall be financed through the money collected from the assessment of fines against licensees; provided that fine moneys, not to exceed ten per cent a year of fines accumulated, may be used to fund public liquor related educational or enforcement programs;
- (4) From time to time to make, amend, and repeal such rules, not inconsistent with this

- chapter, as in the judgment of the commission seem appropriate for carrying out this chapter and for the efficient administration thereof, and the proper conduct of the business of all licensees, including every matter or thing required to be done or which may be done with the approval or consent or by order or under the direction or supervision of or as prescribed by the commission; which rules, when adopted as provided in chapter 91 shall have the force and effect of law;
- (5) Subject to chapter 76, to appoint and remove an administrator, who may also be appointed an investigator and who shall be responsible for the operations and activities of the staff. The administrator may hire and remove hearing officers, investigators, and clerical or other assistants as its business may from time to time require, to prescribe their duties, and fix their compensation; to engage the services of experts and persons engaged in the practice of a profession, if deemed expedient. Every investigator, within the scope of the investigator's duties, shall have the powers of a police officer;
- (6) To limit the number of licenses of any class or kind within the county, or the number of licenses of any class or kind to do business in any given locality, when in the judgment of the commission such limitations are in the public interest;
- (7) To prescribe the nature of the proof to be furnished, the notices to be given, and the conditions to be met or observed in case of the issuance of a duplicate license in place of one alleged to have been lost or destroyed, including a requirement of any indemnity deemed

appropriate to the case;

- (8) To fix the hours between which licensed premises of any class or classes may regularly be open for the transaction of business, which shall be uniform throughout the county as to each class respectively;
- (9) To prescribe all forms to be used for the purposes of this chapter not otherwise provided for in this chapter, and the character and manner of keeping of books, records, and accounts to be kept by licensees in any matter pertaining to their business:
- (10) To investigate violations of this chapter, chapter 244D and, notwithstanding any law to the contrary, violations of the applicable department of health's allowable noise levels, through its investigators or otherwise, to include covert operations, and to report violations to the prosecuting officer for prosecution and, where appropriate, the director of taxation to hear and determine complaints against any licensee:
- (11) To prescribe, by rule, the terms, conditions, and circumstances under which persons or any class of persons may be employed by holders of licenses;
- (12) To prescribe, by rule, the term of any license or solicitor's and representative's permit authorized by this chapter, the annual or prorated amount, the manner of payment of fees for the licenses and permits, and the amount of filing fees; and
- (13) To prescribe, by rule, the circumstances and penalty for the unauthorized manufacturing or selling of any liquor.

(b) Subject only to this chapter, the commission or board and each member thereof shall have the same powers respecting the administering of oaths, compelling the attendance of witnesses and the production of documentary evidence, and examining the witnesses as are possessed by a circuit court, except that the commission or board and each member thereof shall not be bound by the strict legal rules of evidence. In addition, the commission or board shall have the power to require the production of, and to examine any books, papers, and records of any licensee which may pertain to the licensee's business under the license or which may pertain to a matter at a hearing before the commission or board or to an investigation by the commission or board.

The exercise by the commission or board of the power, authority, and discretion vested in it pursuant to this chapter shall be final and shall not be reviewable by or appealable to any court or tribunal, except as otherwise provided in this chapter or chapter 91.

LIQUOR CONTROL ADJUDICATION BOARD

The Liquor Control Adjudication Board consists of nine members appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the County Council. The Board functions as a quasi-judicial body whose primary responsibility is to hear administrative complaints of the director regarding violations of the liquor control laws of the state and the rules of the Liquor Commission, and to impose penalties for violations thereof as may be provided by law.

DIRECTOR OF THE DEPARTMENT OF LIQUOR CONTROL

The Commission appoints the Director of the Department of Liquor Control, County of Maui. Franklyn L. Silva was appointed as Director on July 1, 1993 and was the third Director and fourth Administrator appointed by the Commission since 1933. He retired on November 1, 2015 serving as Director for 22 years. Glenn Mukai was appointed as the new Director effective June 1, 2016, making him the fourth Director and fifth Administrator.

The Director is the Administrative Head of the Department and is responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the Department, providing the necessary administrative support services to the Commission and Board throughout the year; providing necessary education, licensing and permit services; and enforcing the liquor laws of the state and the Rules of the Liquor Commission, County of Maui.

The Commission is responsible for the granting, renewing, or denying of any application for a liquor license. The Director is empowered to act upon all applications for renewals, special licenses, temporary licenses, transient vessel licenses, and other matters that do not require a public hearing.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR OF THE DEPARTMENT OF LIQUOR CONTROL

The Director appoints the Deputy Director of the Department of Liquor Control. The Deputy Director serves as the Administrative Head whenever the Director is not available, ensuring services are provided in a timely manner, and the continuity in the Department's mission, goals and objectives are achieved.

The permit system is utilized as a vehicle for control purposes. Permits may be subject to conditions necessary to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the public. Conditions are placed after careful consideration of each application.

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DEPARTMENT OPERATIONS & ACTIVITIES

I.D. CHECKING GUIDE

The Department purchased and distributed the 2016 I.D. Checking Guide to all licensees. Material in the Guide helps licensees detect fraudulent identifications quickly by simply matching the questioned I.D. against the actual-sized, full-colored license in the Guide, and by looking for the physical characteristics of the license described in the Guide, including the issuing agency's policy on laminations, specific state seals and identifying techniques.

CERTIFICATION

On every licensed premises, an on-duty managerial or supervisory employee (who has successfully completed a certification examination on liquor laws and rules of the commission and attended a server training program) must be in active charge of each premises during all times that such premises is open for business.

A total of 2,394 persons took the certification examination in Fiscal Year 2016 and those who passed were required to attend the server training program immediately following the exam. The effectiveness of this program is reflected in the relatively high rate of compliance with managerial requirements imposed by the Rules of the Liquor Commission, County of Maui.

For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2016, there were 2,080 applicants who successfully passed the examination and were duly certified.

REGISTRATION

Minors are persons under 21 years of age.

Effective April 2012, licensees must only register minors under the age of 18 prior to the employment of, or the entertainment by, such minor.

A total of 208 minors were registered in Fiscal \overline{Y} ear 2016.

In a premises in which employees or entertainers are compensated to sit with patrons (Class 5, Category D, licenses) whether or not the employees or entertainers are consuming nonalcoholic beverages while in the company of such patrons, the licensee shall cause all employees to be registered with the department at the time of employment.

A total of 141 employees were registered in Fiscal Year 2016.

DEPARTMENT OPERATIONS & ACTIVITIES

STATE LEGISLATURE

There were several liquor-related bills, introduced this legislative session. HB2422 HD1 made it through the entire legislative process and was signed into law by the Governor. Here is a brief summary of the bill:

Act 012 (16) states in part, provided that if the licensee is a publicly-traded company, or an entity ultimately solely owned by a publicly-traded company, the licensee shall, within thirty days from the date of election of any replacement of an officer designated as a primary decisionmaker regarding the purchase and sale of liquor, notify the commission in writing of the name, age, and place of residence of the officers.

Act 012 (16) was signed by the Governor on April 22, 2016 and took effect upon its approval.

STATISTICAL INFORMATION

Statistical information consisting of "Exhibits" covering an account of our receipts and disbursements in accordance with law, as well as comparative statistical studies related to liquor licenses in the County of Maui, are hereby presented.
