SUBJECT: WEBINAR ON LEGAL ETHICS BY WINSTEIN ETHICS

CONVERSATION SERIES (PAF 21-012(15))

On July 20, 2021, we attended a webinar entitled "Legal Ethics," which was presented by the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa Shidler College of Business as part of the Will Weinstein Ethics Conversation Series, "Integrity and Ethics in the Real World." Please see the attached flyer for a rundown of the series. This webinar was moderated by Will Weinstein, and the panelists were:

- Judge Richard Clifton, Senior Judge of the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit.
- Ken Lawson, Professor, William S. Richardson School of Law, University of Hawai'i at Mānoa.
- Camille Nelson, Dean, William S. Richardson School of Law, University of Hawai'i at Mānoa.
- Tony Piazza, Attorney at Law, Principal, Mediated Negotiations.

The video of the session can be found at https://vimeo.com/shidlercollege. The presenters addressed some of the changes that have occurred in the legal profession due to the COVID-19 pandemic, along with the following:

- The need to discuss legal ethics early and often. Legal ethics should be raised in the same way professional licensure is discussed to allow for greater socialization of ethical norms.
- The high costs of legal services, both litigation and mediation. Often, by the time parties arrive at mediation, they have already spent more than the cost of the ultimate settlement. There is a need to publicize pro bono mediation services, the Ninth Circuit's mediation program, and other services to help litigants cut costs.

- Mental health as an important part of the legal profession. A study from Johns Hopkins University indicated that, of 104 professions, attorneys had the highest rates of substance abuse, addiction, and divorce. Legal students and attorneys should be taught to accept who they are, with their strengths and weaknesses, rather than looking for outside validation. One way in which the legal profession is evolving is to provide more mental-health support to help lawyers navigate the profession's stresses and to lessen the stigma of mental vulnerabilities.
- Legal ethics rules through the lens of the lawsuits following the 2020 election. Panelists highlighted Rule 4.1 "Truthfulness in Statements to Others," of the American Bar Association's Model Rules of Conduct. Even when speaking to an audience or reporters, an attorney is bound by ethics rules, opening them up to censure or suspension by jurisdictions in which they are licensed to practice law.

The panelists closed the session by role playing various scenarios posing ethical dilemmas, both from real cases and hypotheticals. Panelists noted legal ethics can sometimes conflict with personal ethics, in which case an attorney should seek to withdraw from representation.

We found the presentation informative and would encourage anyone who is interested to watch the video.
